- Managing ideas and information
- Enhancing the clarity and artistry of communication
- Respecting, supporting, and collaborating with others

- writing process and formatting
- writing for various purposes and audiences (formal and creative writing)
- critical and creative thinking
- considering various perspectives

PROVINCIAL ACHIEVEMENT TESTS

Provincial Achievement Tests (PATs) are administered to students in grades 9. The purpose of the Provincial Achievement Testing program is to determine if students are learning what they are expected to learn, to report to Albertans how well students have achieved provincial standards at given points in their schooling, and to assist schools, authorities, and the province in monitoring and improving student learning.

Grade 9 students at WH Croxford will participate in Provincial Achievement Tests in Math, Science, ELA, Social Studies in June 2019. These preliminary test scores will be reported to parents and will be included as 10% of the final grade.

COMMON GRADE 9 EXPECTATIONS:

- Students are to respect each other's right to learn in a safe and respectful environment. Personal attacks or insults based on personal, religious, cultural etc. beliefs will not be tolerated.
- Students will respect the teacher's right to teach. This includes paying attention when we are speaking and treating us as you would any other adult in the school.
- Students will come to class ready to learn and participate to the best of your ability. This includes being ready with supplies for the day, and a willingness to learn.
- This is a professional work environment. You are expected to dress and act accordingly, and exercise maturity and self-control.
- Students will use materials and technology in an appropriate and respectful manner. <u>Use of your</u> <u>devices are a privilege, not a right.</u> Your device is to assist in your learning, therefore, my expectation is that you will NOT use it in a manner that is distracting to your learning, my teaching, and your classmates' learning. This means: no headphones in during discussions or lessons, no flashing lights, vibrations or ringtones during class, no music so loud we can hear it even though your headphones are in, no checking your phone or texting. If you choose to NOT adhere to these standards, your choice will be made for you, your phone will be placed in the phone area for the remainder of class, and you may reclaim it at the end of class. If this is a continual struggle, parents will be notified and an action plan to help you have the best learning experience will be created. I value my time with you and I will hold myself accountable to the same standards.
- WH Croxford is a 1-to-1 school. Students should bring a personal device that will support working and learning in this environment. A laptop or tablet are considered appropriate learning technologies. Cell phones are NOT learning devices. Devices should be charged, updated, and ready to use at the start of each day.
- <u>It is the student's responsibility to make up missed work</u>. All assignments will be available in our Google Classroom. You will be in contact with your parents on a regular basis to provide academic updates.
- All assignments <u>MUST</u> be completed. If an assignment is missed, not completed, or not handed in, you will be required to complete this assignment during CAST periods if necessary. CAST is intended to support your academic success.
- If you are ill or unable to hand in an assignment on the due date, you are to contact the teacher **prior to the date**, to make arrangements for completing the work.
- If you know that you are going to miss a due date or test date due to absence, it is your responsibility to contact your teacher to let him/her know.

REGARDING PLAGIARISM:

Students are expected to exercise academic honesty and acknowledge the sources (print and internet) used in completing various tasks throughout the year. Sources of information must be cited using an appropriate format for giving credit where credit is due, such as including a bibliography, or works cited list (<u>www.citationmachine.com</u>). To submit work that is not completely your own is plagiarism. If you are ever unsure, check with your teachers before you hand work in. Plagiarized work will be returned and not included for course evaluation until it is corrected and resubmitted.
